FATHER VATTMAN'S DEATH.

On Monday, September 29, Father Vattman, member of our Board of Education, passed away after a short sickness at St. Francis' Hospital in Evanston. School was dismissed on Thursday to allow his many friends in the school to attend the services held in St. Joseph's Church, Gross Point.

Father Vattman was for many years prominent in public life—as a statesman, churchman and educator. He received honors from the American government and also from the Vatican, and yet with all his other interests he worked tirelessly for the advancement of our school and was always a staunch supporter of every progressive measure. His place will be hard indeed to fill.

SECRETARY ELLIOTT'S SPEECH.

Yesterday "Dad" Elliott, ex-star football player of the champion Northwestern teams and at present prominent in Y. M. C. A. work, delivered an inspiring address in General Assembly. In his direct and forceful manner he defined a quitter as one "who fails to do in a game that which he has been coached to do in practice." He drove home the lesson that the moral quitter is even more reprehensible than the physical one, citing several of his own experiences in support of this. He concluded with an eloquent appeal that we practice faithfully to perfect ourselves in honesty and self-control in the hope that we may be suitable to answer the world's call for worthy leaders.

NEW TRIER, 0; LANE TECH, 0.

On Saturday the Big Black Team staged its second game of the season by playing Lane Technical High School to a scoreless tie. The game was a better one than last week's despite the inability of either team to score. Our attack was greatly weakened by the absence of Richards, who is suffering with an injured foot, and of MacLean, who was incapacitated with a combination of bruised ribs and a hunting trip. The return of Captain Kerr, however, compensated somewhat for the loss and it was only too apparent that the Black offense lacked only one thing—steadiness. It has plenty of power and speed. It needs only consistent practice to round it into championship form.

Kerr, aside from his unsteadiness, played a wonderful game. The same can be said of Burrows. Their plunging was all that could be desired. Their frequent fumbles offset their gains, however. The shifting of Wright to the backfield weakened the line very markedly and it was through his former position that Lane made most of their gains. He ran his plays from halfback well, but his steadying influence as passer was sadly missed.

Burrows made several substantial gains through tackle. His style of plunging strongly resembles that of Jack Searle and with practice he should become every bit as formidable a back as the famous Jack. It seemed to us that with Wright ahead

AN HONOR.

On Wednesday of last week Prof. H. A. Hollister of the University of Illinois visited us in his official capacity of High School Visitor of the State. He addressed the school briefly in General Assembly, outlining the entrance requirements for the State University and explaining the new ruling concerning the requiring of a definite degree of excellence in English Composition of all students entering the university in any department.

During his visit Prof. Hollister expressed himself as greatly impressed with the work of our school. He mentioned particularly our course in South American History or History IIIB. He said that New Trier was the only high school in the entire state offering such a course and that although credit had not been allowed for it heretofore in entrance to the university, he would take pains to see that such credit would be forthcoming in the near future. He is very desirous that this particular study should be widely introduced throughout the state and has, therefore, asked Miss Ulrick to present the matter to the Social Science Section of the Illinois State Conference which meets at Champaign next month. We feel highly gratified to know that Miss Ulrick's lead in introducing this course has been officially recognized. The school is to be congratulated upon the honor attached to having her put on the program at the biggest Conference in the state.

MR. SNYDER SPEAKS.

We are entering upon our third week of practice. The second and third teams are doing better work which always means some good opposition for the first liners and that we must have if our team is going to develop into a strong, fast bunch. During the first two weeks there have been a few slight injuries due to practice in tackling and blocking and falling on the ball. More attention has been given to tackling and blocking than ever before in the preliminary work. I feel that we have always been weak in these particular things and the plan is to keep this sort of practice up until near mid-season. The injuries spoken of have not been at all serious and there would not have been as many but for the green material and the fact that the boys were not well hardened. From this time on we do not expect

that we will have many injuries and that soon they will be a negligible quantity and our warriors will be in first-class condition to begin the march for the championship.

Clore and Kuelzow have been showing some good stuff at the end positions. Billy Kerr and Wallie Weld have been showing what they have been absorbing in former years as second stringers at guard and tackle positions. Wright, undoubtedly the best center in the league and the best snapper back I have ever known on a high school team, is there with the goods and does much toward steady-ing the team.

Richards, although good last year in carrying the ball, promises to be much better this year and he is also developing into a good kicker. He has been able to put the ball almost to the goal line on the kick-off. He is a good fighter and never quits. MacLean, who was in the service for a year, is now one of our biggest men and is playing well at fullback and can do a good job as a lineman also. He has had a little injury which has kept him from doing his best but that will be O. K. in a few days. Weinecke is a good line plunger, a good punter, and can play a very good game at tackle position. It is his first year in the backfield and he does well. He is a very husky lad but very bashful. Keep a look-out for "Bob"; he's going to bust things up for the enemy.

Dick Burrows looks the part of a real quarterback and has begun to show us that he can fill the place. That year with the marines has made him a better scrapper than ever and you can wager that "Andy" is going to be a good general.

Burt and Rand have not had time to show their worth at the quarterback position. But from performances of the past two weeks Rand has shown himself to be as fast as any of them and he is a good dodger, making him a hard man to drop. Burt was unfortunate in having a couple ribs hurt early in the practice and has been out of it for a while. He will be back in a few days and will show us that he is the kind of fearless fellow without whom a football team is not much good.

Killen is back in the game after a year's lay-off and does well at halfback. He is a good tackler and with his football experience he should be a valuable player.

Brown, Varney, Howard, Budd, in line give promise.

of him in the line and a smoothly charging backfield, he and Kerr would be well-nigh unstoppable.

For Lane, Captain Prigg at full-back, Darrah at half, and Linklater at end starred. They, with their heavier team-mates, took the ball within our twenty-yard line four times but, thanks to the rallying of the Black line; they were unable to convert their advantage into a score.

The game in detail:

First Half.

Prigg kicked off to Weld who was downed on the 35-yard line. Wright made a yard around end. He fumbled on the next play and the ball rolled to midfield where Darrah recovered for Lane. The Black line smothered three plays and Prigg punted to Burrows on the 20. Kerr made it first down in two plunges off tackle. Burrows made 4 more but Lane held and Weinecke punted short to Lane's 40. Again Lane failed to gain and Prigg sent another pretty punt to our 20-yard line. Kerr made 7 through the line but fumbled on the next play, and Weinecke punted to midfield. Lane failed to gain in 3 attempts and Prigg again punted. Burrows made a pretty return, bringing the ball back to midfield. It was as near as N. T. came to scoring. A fumble on the first down gave the ball again to Lane. Wackendorf made 10 yards on a trick formation. Wagner and Darrah took the ball to the 25-yard line. N. T. held and Prigg attempted a place-kick from directly in front of the uprights. The ball went wide by inches.

N. T. took the ball on the 20-yard line. Burrows shot through tackle for 7. Linklater recovered a fumble on the next play. Again N. T. held and Prigg tried another place-kick but missed by a big margin.

Again N. T. took the ball on the 20. Kerr tore through tackle for first down. Burrows and Kerr made another first down. Then Lane held and Weinecke sent a beautiful punt out of bounds on Lane's 8-yard line. Prigg immediately punted to midfield. Weinecke and Burrows smashed through for a first down, but a penalty for off-side halted the advance and Lane took the ball on downs just as the half ended.

Second Half.

Prigg kicked off to Kuelzow, who returned the ball to the 34-yard line. Weinecke and Wright made 8 through

the line but another penalty halted the advance and Weinecke punted to Lane's 40.

A forward pass, Prigg to Meissner, netted 17 yards. Wasckendorf and Wagner brought the ball to our 8-yard line. Here N. T. braced and turned back four plays, taking the ball on downs. Weinecke punted from behind the goal to Lane's 40-yard line, the longest punt of the game. Lane made two first downs on line plays. Then Kerr threw Wackendorf for a 7-yard loss. The tackle was so fierce that the Lane quarterback was laid out. He resumed play, however. Clore threw Wagner for another large loss and Prigg punted over N. T.'s goal. Another fumble gave Lane the ball on our 25-yard line. The Lane backs could not gain and Prigg tried a drop-kick. The ball struck the scrimmage line and bounded into Weinecke's hands. He almost succeeded in breaking loose, the last Lane player tackling him on our 40-yard line. Lane held and Weinecke punted to their 30. Prigg immediately returned the kick and Burrows was downed on his 25. Another fumble gave the ball to Lane. Kerr intercepted Prigg's forward pass on the 20. Burrows and Weinecke made it first down, the game ending with the ball in N. T.'s possession on our 30-yard line.
